Classroom management and preventative school discipline must be integrated and working together with effective academic instruction in a positive and safe school climate to maximize success for all students.

As a family, what can you do?

- Reinforce the KHA Code
- Discuss with your child ways to be safe, kind, respectful, and responsible at home and in the community
- Check your student's folder and behavior calendar daily
- Ask them if they earned an Eagle Buck today and what was it for?
- Praise positive notes and marks
- Discuss any think time or orange sheets sent home.
 Sign and return them to school



School Wide Reinforcement

Eagle Bucks

Students who display exceptional Eagle Code behaviors will be acknowledged through Eagle Bucks. Any staff member can give an Eagle Buck. These can be accumulated and redeemed at the KHA school store biweekly. Students can earn everything from pencils to special privileges (i.e. visiting another classroom, lunch with a teacher, etc.)

Daily Documentation

Every student will have a behavior calendar in their planner or folder. It is the teacher and/or students responsibility to document daily behavior. It is the family's responsibility to check it every night and reinforce the Eagle Code at home. If a <u>blue</u> "think time" sheet or an <u>orange</u> parent note comes home regarding problematic behaviors, please discuss them with your student. Sign and return these notes as directed.

Class Pride

Classes can also work together and earn trophies to be displayed with pride in their classrooms. Some examples are: the cleanest classroom for the month, the best recycling class, or the safest class during a fire drill.

KHA Eagle Code

We are a community of learners here at Kingston Hill Academy. We strive to support all students and staff by teaching and promoting positive behavior school wide. We have four rules which are enforced in all areas of the school on a daily basis.

<u>We expect KHA students to</u> <u>always be kind, be safe, be</u> <u>respectful, and be responsible.</u>

When the school rules are followed, students have an opportunity to receive recognition for their efforts through praise, receiving Eagle Bucks, and whole class rewards. When the school rules are not followed, specific consequences result.

Universal Consequences

Each class has the same behavior plan, but the visual model varies from the lower grades (Busy Bee hive) to the upper grades (Flip a Card). Students start each morning with a clean slate or on *GREEN*. Students can receive a verbal reminder about behavior and still remain on *GREEN*. Students who choose not to follow the Eagle Code, and the behavior becomes problematic, there are a series of consequences ...

<u>YELLOW – Visual Warning</u> A reminder to check behavior

BLUE – "Think Time"

Five minute break (*not* during instruction) in which students are to record the incident(s), think, and plan how to get their behavior back on track

ORANGE - Parent Contact

Ten minutes of recess lost and a phone call/email/note home regarding the problematic behavior(s) for the day

<u>RED – OFFICE</u>

Sent to the office with an immediate phone call home by administration ***Certain behaviors warrant immediate administrative and parent involvement, such as fighting, using inappropriate language, threats, etc.
